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

German ensemble Liquid Penguin records the joyful sounds of Naples with 'FeliCittà'

An acoustic documentary to immortalize the words and sounds that the Neapolitan people associate with the idea of joy, wellbeing and peace. Director Katharina Bihler and composer Stefan Scheib, of German ensemble Liquid Penguin, achieved this feat with 'FeliCittà' an initiative promoted by the Goethe Institut as part of the 'Cantiere Felicità' project.


For roughly two weeks, in September the Liquid Penguin travelled around Naples with their Glückscontainer, a 'happiness confessional', resembling a photo booth. Random citizens were stopped and asked to step inside to tell the pair about the sounds that they

associate with happiness. The interviewers then recorded the respondents' answers.

The German duo not only interviewed both citizens and institutions but also travelled around the outskirts of the centre recording the most disparate and typical sounds: from the sound of the waves on the Lungomare to the silence of the Certosa, from the music played at the Conservatory of San Pietro a Majella to the sound of Caserta Vecchia right up to that of Solfatara. In short, they recorded the joyful voice of Naples.

The Liquid Penguin have worked since 1996 in the field of contemporary music and sound art.

Tableaux Vivants from Caravaggio

Eight actors bring Caravaggio's masterpieces to life



A live stage show of enormous visual impact. Twenty three canvases inspired by the work of Caravaggio come to life on stage, right before your eyes, using the "tableaux vivants" technique. Using the most basic elements (fabrics of various colours and textures and everyday objects), the actors 'compose' the 23 canvases in front of the audience. Once constructed, the painting creates the scene as it would have appeared in the artist's studio. Within a matter of seconds, costumes and drapery are expertly transformed by the actors who each take on the role of model, set designer, costume designer and props manager. The action is immobilized as if illuminated by one lone flash of light, one 'perfect' gesture brings to life the heart of the painting. Impeccable iconographic precision, the expressive force of bodies and faces illuminated by a lateral beam of light, fully bring out the 'poetry of reality', the element that distinguishes the works of Michelangelo da Caravaggio.



The cult of the dead

SIGHTSEEING A meld of the sacred and the profane, curiosities and Neapolitan traditions linked to 'All Souls' month. From the souls in Purgatory to culinary customs

In Naples, where myth, legend and mystery blend together, the cult of the dead has assumed a picturesque, fairytale-like aura. A walk down the busiest, narrowest streets in the heart of the city is enough to understand the depth of people's commitment and devotion. There are tabernacles and shrines protected by glass cases and adorned with fresh flowers and eternal lights. They are embellished by rosaries, images of the Virgin, statues with agonized expressions surrounded by flames – the so-called "souls of Purgatory" – photos of the deceased, votive candles and flowers. In Naples, the faithful attribute the Dead and "souls of Purgatory" with functions that the Catholic religion only ascribes to saints, namely the power of answering prayers and visiting the world of the living when the mood so moves them. However, praying for the souls of the dead is not a one-sided affair. Though prayers are said for their souls, benefits of a practical nature are asked for in return: e.g. finding a husband, a job, or help with winning the lottery. Obviously, the recently departed cannot talk but will, nonetheless, find a way of getting in touch with the person calling upon

them. This generally happens during a dream when the deceased appears in person and gives precise indications which are then interpreted using the so-called "Smorfia", a typical Neapolitan book which associates words with numbers, enabling dreams to be transformed into numbers so that people can play the lottery. The case of the cult of the "souls of Purgatory" is different: this time, it is not the deceased who appear to their loved ones in dreams but the "souls of Purgatory", i.e. the deceased devoid of family, abandoned souls who have never had a dignified burial and are, therefore, amassed in common ossuaries. They ask people to pray for them and look after them so that they can leave Purgatory (the world of the living) to reach their final destination (hell or heaven). In this case too, dreams act

as a go-between between the living and the dead. In fact, the lost soul appears in a dream and shows where, amidst piles of bones, his/her bodily remains lie. The faithful then goes to the designated cemetery, adopts the skull of the dead person (known as the "capuzzella") and builds a so-called "scarabattolo", a sort of display cabinet, like a rudimentary altar, that will act as a home for the skull. He/she then polishes the skull and displays it for everyone to see. The devotee then returns periodically to visit the lost soul who, thanks to his/her devotion, will finally be able to "cross over". The day chosen for visits to dead souls is Monday and the month dedicated to them is November. The Neapolitan cult of the "capuzzelle" is concentrated in three places: the Fontanelle Cemetery, in the heart of the Rione Sanità district,

between via Foria and the heart of Capodimonte; the Church of Santa Maria del Purgatorio, on the Upper Decumanus, in today's via dei Tribunali and the Basilica of San Pietro ad Aram, in a side-street of corso Umberto, just behind piazza Garibaldi. In all three places you can find dozens and dozens of skulls of the late lamented to "adopt". Rebecca Horn drew inspiration from the Fontanelle Cemetery to make the installation commissioned in 2002. The work, entitled "Spiriti di Madreperla", was exhibited in Piazza del Plebiscito in Naples: it consisted of 333 bronze skulls sunk into the cobblestones and 77 neon angels' halos hanging above the heads of passersby, thus serving as a stark contrast to the ghostly skulls. According to Horn, it was this contrast that embodied the real meaning of her work.

WHERE NOW | NEAPOLITAN TRADITIONS


Today, several of those skulls are a part of another installation, "Spirits", on permanent display at the Museo Madre in Naples.

Here, the individually lit "capuzzelle" are hung on the walls, each with its own mobile mirror in which visitors can see their reflections. The whole is further enhanced by the solemn voice of musician Hayden Danyl Chisholm. Horn's intention is to give visitors the idea of a life that even death cannot end, because it becomes a part of eternity.

The story of how the "capuzzelle" installation came about is extremely intriguing. In 2002,

during a visit to Naples, the German artist visited a couple of octogenarians at their home in vico Lammatari, in the Sanità district.

It was here that she learnt about the cult of the souls of Purgatory, nameless, abandoned souls whose skulls are amassed at the Fontanelle Cemetery where the devout go to adopt a skull (capuzzella), looking after it, polishing it and praying for its soul. She was so awed by this unique Neapolitan tradition that she decided to create her "Spiriti di madreperla" masterpiece (Museo Madre. Via Settembrini, 79, Naples www.madrenapoli.it).



Culinary traditions of the Day of the Dead

'All Souls' day amidst tantalizing specialities and old beliefs: the most popular foods and their ritualistic meanings. A meld of tradition and good food



NOUGAT OF THE DEAD

In keeping with Neapolitan tradition, on 2 November, 'All Souls day, the locals prepare a special sweet treat known at the nougat of the dead. It is softer than most and, under a layer of dark chocolate, it hides a heart of chocolate and hazelnuts.



WHEAT

A symbol of life and fertility, when combined with mulled wine, pomegranate seeds, cinnamon, walnuts and sugar, this delicacy is part of the ritual celebrations in Campania and, in general, in Southern Italy associated with the Day of the Dead.



PUMPKIN

A symbol of fertility dating as far back as Greek and Latin times, pumpkin is used to ward off evil spirits. A popular dish, especially in November, it pairs beautifully with pasta but can also be grilled and dressed with vinegar and parsley.



CHICKPEAS

In olden days, on 2 November, chickpeas were offered to the souls of the dead so that they could satiate their hunger before returning to the other world. Chickpea soup is a typical dish of Neapolitan tradition associated with the dead.



BROAD BEANS

Since time immemorial, broad beans were the food dedicated to the dead and were served as the main course at funeral banquets. Their long stalks, which penetrate the soil deep down, were believed to be able to put the living in touch with the dead.

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


Naples and its castles

The richest and best-preserved castles in Naples. A trip amidst towers, ancient legends, architectural treasures and breathtaking views, in discovery of the symbols of the city



Castel dell'Ovo



Castel Nuovo, Maschio Angioino

There are seven castles in the city: Castel Nuovo, also known as Maschio Angioino, Castel Sant'Elmo, Castel Capuano, Castel dell'Ovo, Castello del Carmine, the one in Nisida and the fortress of Vigliena. The first four are the most representative not only on account of their historical backgrounds but also because they are better preserved.

CASTEL DELL'OVO

The oldest in the city, Castel dell'Ovo is a landmark attraction due to its position and architecture. The castle stands on the tiny isle of Megaride where, according to legend, the siren Pantenope washed ashore. Its name, the Egg Castle, derives from an ancient legend according to which the poet Virgil placed an egg under its foundations, a magical egg on which the destiny of the city is thought to hang. On passing through its entrance, visitors will have the feeling of having entered another dimension, due to the light that filters through the apertures overlooking the sea.

Breathtaking views can be enjoyed from its panoramic terrace: on the one side the sea and, on the other, the city with the Bay of Naples and

Vesuvius silhouetted in the background. The little lanes beneath the thick walls are lined with the houses of Borgo Marinaro, a former fisherman's haunt where quaint lanes are now lined with pleasant bars and pizzerias.

CASTEL CAPUANO

Built in the 12th century by the Normans, it takes its name from the nearby gate Porta Capuano, one of the many gates in the city, leading to Capua. It is the second oldest castle in Naples and also one of the most significant examples of Norman architecture. Over the years, it has housed all the city's courts of justice: the 'Salone dei Busti' hosts all the busts of the princes of the Forum of Naples.

PH. RITA CHILIBERTI

CASTEL NUOVO, MASCHIO ANGIOINO

Another symbol of Naples, Castel Nuovo looms majestically in piazza Municipio. Commissioned by Charles I of Anjou in 1266 when he moved the capital of the Kingdom from Palermo to Naples, the castle owes its current architecture to the Aragonese sovereigns. The majestic marble portal at its entrance was commissioned by Alfonso of Aragon to celebrate the victories of his dynasty. Inside, the stark stone Hall of the Barons is named after the barons arrested and slaughtered here for having plotted against him. Legend has it that the prisoners of Castel Nuovo disappeared mysteriously because they were thrown into the ditch surrounding the castle where they were fed to an enormous African crocodile.

CASTEL SANT'ELMO

The highest fortress in the city, it stands on the hill of Vomero, in a strategic position. Of Norman origin, it boasts several magnificent panoramic terraces: the city lies at its foot showing itself in all of its splendour, with the profile of Vesuvius acting as a backdrop to the thick maze of the city's narrow streets. It is only after admiring Naples like this, from above, that you can say that you have truly seen it. Following the Neapolitan Revolution of 1799, it became the prison of the most important protagonists of the Revolution, including Giustino Fortunato and Luisa Sanfelice: according to legend, terrifying screams could be heard emanating from its underground passages. Today it is a museum that is well worth a visit.

CASTELLO DEL CARMINE

Standing in piazza Mercato, all that remains of the Castello del Carmine, built in 1382 by Charles III of Durazzo, is the Spinella Tower and a stretch of the Aragonese wall flanking it.

CASTELLO DI NISIDA

Dating back to the 16th century, the Castello di Nisida was first a hospice for those suffering from the plague during the terrible epidemic of 1626 and subsequently a prison for political prisoners. Today, it houses the city's juvenile prison. Little remains of the Fortezza di Vigliena in the neighbourhood of San Giovanni a Teduccio, partially destroyed during the revolution of 1799.

The province of Benevento, bordering to the South with Irpinia, to the West with Casertano, to the North with Molise and to the East with Puglia, has such unique morphological, historical and anthropological characteristics that for a moment, following the Unification of Italy, there was talk of actually creating a separate region: the Sannio. Where has chosen five communes to accompany you in discovery of a truly fascinating area.

Pietraraja, whose name derives from the French 'pierre rouge' (red stone) present in the area, is a mountain commune surrounded by woods abounding in natural springs. Although its most important monument is the Romanesque Parish Church of Santa Maria Assunta, another unmissable attraction is its Geo-Paleontological Park, with its museum, the Paleolabo, housing fossil finds of considerable note, including *Ciro*, the first baby dinosaur in Italy, several of whose internal organs are still intact.

Cerreto Sannita, an outpost of Sannio Pentro (a Roman bridge known to the locals as 'Annibale' can still be seen here today together with a podium of the only Sannite Temple in Campania), is identified as a 'planned community' on account of its regular urban structure. Its reconstruction was, in fact, based on a project by the Carafa Counts following the earthquake of 1688 which razed the town to the ground. Italian writer and journalist Guido

Piovene described it as follows: "...a complete reconstruction, in true Baroque style, capable of surprising even the most discerning visitors". The archaeological recovery of its medieval centre, known as the 'Medieval Pompeii', is currently in progress. Awarded Orange Flag certification by Touring Club Italiano and boasting 'Città dell'olio' ('City of Oil') designation, Cerreto is renowned for its age-old ceramic-making tradition which flourished following the earthquake of 1688 when the reconstruction of the town attracted scores of Neapolitan potters who, absolved from paying taxes, combined their experience with that of local potters to give life to a new, more opulent, Baroque-style porcelain.

Since that time, the ceramics of Cerreto have become highly sought-after objects. In fact, several of the figurines displayed in the manger of the Reggia di Caserta, were actually crafted by master potters from Cerreto.

For more than three centuries, Cerreto has shared

the art of ceramic-making with the nearby commune of **San Lorenzo**. Its historic centre boasts two churches, the Church of San Lorenzo, which houses the wooden sculpture of the town's patron saint, and the Church of the Congregazione della Sanità, rich in exquisite ceramic works of art including a majolica tympanum by Antonio Giustiniani. Along the via Regia, on the banks of the river Terno, we find the Park of San Sebastiano, home to the City of Dinosaurs, an educational park stretching over roughly one hectare where visitors can admire fifteen reproductions of fiberglass dinosaurs located in evocative natural surroundings.

Guardia Sanframondi owes its name to the Sanframondo family who built an imposing medieval castle here. Today, the castle serves as the town's cultural hub and is used for performances, film screenings, art and photographic exhibitions. The commune, renowned, above all, for its noble wines produced by the Guardiense winery, is a

picturesque area whose distinguishing features include its lovely medieval town, rolling hills dotted with pine and oak woods but, above all, vast stretches of vineyards and olive groves. The historical centre, built up around the castle, though partly abandoned following the earthquake of 1980, still retains several medieval attractions of note. The area is home to a number of lovely small Baroque churches. Lastly, we recommend pushing farther north to the picturesque village of **Cusano Mutri**, whose typically medieval historical centre retains all of its original old-world charm intact with its narrow streets, porticoes and houses boasting elaborately stone-worked portals and windows. The largest church in the commune is the Church of San Giovanni Battista whose precious shrine contains a thorn from the woven crown of thorns placed on the head of Jesus during the events leading up to his Crucifixion.



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What is the annual influx of visitors to Mav?

In 2014, we registered more than 70,000 visits to the site of Herculaneum, plus another 120,000 visitors to exhibitions organized abroad. 2015 has seen an increase in this trend: the exhibition held in Warsaw, which ended last month, registered an influx of more than 100,000 visitors.

What are the latest attractions at Mav?

In 2015, we introduced 7 new installations regarding the Villa of the Papyri, an interactive map of Herculaneum and a machine that delivers fragrances.

Future projects?

Since 2010, we have been working on the MAV ON TOUR project. An itinerant museum project on Pompeii and Herculaneum, which will travel around the world. We have staged exhibitions in Barcelona, Chile, Madrid and Warsaw. We have participated in various exhibitions in collaboration with



the British Museum in London and with the Kunst Foundation in Hamburg. We are also preparing an exhibition which is scheduled to travel to France in 2016.



LATICAUDA PECORINO

It takes its name from the breed of sheep with whose milk it is made. It has a hard, firm rind, yellowy-orange in colour. Its body is tender and ivory-white in colour. It has a mouth-filling, slightly tangy flavour and an intense pungent nose. This type of cheese is best eaten when mature.



STREGA LIQUEUR

Made from herbs, it has been produced since 1860 by the Strega Alberti Distillery in Benevento using a secret recipe. Its yellow color comes from the presence of saffron in its recipe.

It has a 40% alcohol content and is made using some 70 different herbs, including mint and fennel.

ARTICHOKES FROM PIETRELCINA

Sweet Campania

The best sweet wines of the region should be drunk in smaller glasses in order to allow us to savour their bouquets and linger (read meditate) over their elegance

This month we will be focusing on a category of truly special wines, also known as meditation wines. We are here referring to sweet wines, i.e. those commonly drunk at the end of a meal.

Sadly, I must confess that, in Italy, these wines are not as fully appreciated as they should be. This is especially true of the South whose hot climate tends to increase their sugar and alcohol content. Southerners are not particularly fond of sweet wines. In fact, as far as the Neapolitans are concerned, the best accompaniment to a dessert is coffee!

Each wine has a sense as long as it can be paired with something. If we only consider drinking sweet wines as an accompaniment to dessert, we tend to limit the number of

occasions during which their innate elegance and intensity can be savoured to the full. Why not try them, for example, as connoisseurs do in France, with cheese or fatty calves liver, or even as an aperitivo option.

First and foremost, a sweet wine should not be too sweet. It should be fresh and have the kind of complexity that makes one want to drink it. However, very few sweet wines actually have these characteristics! As always, everything starts in the vineyard. Not all varieties are suited to making a noble sweet wine.

Not only must the grapes be extremely healthy but often wine-makers do not have the certainty that they will be able to be produced on a yearly basis owing to the complex production process involved. Having said this, to preserve the acid backbone of the grapes, it is necessary to harvest them or cut their shoots (so that they begin to shrivel on the vine) at exactly the right moment: either early or on several occasions.

The rest depends on the techniques employed at the winery: the slow, natural drying process of the grapes designed to increase the sugar concentration, the style of vinification and the use of specific types of wood.

Lastly, the ageing process in bottles which helps them develop more complexity. Our sweet wine should be served in a small glass with a narrow mouth, so that its bouquet can be savoured to the full.

Il Sasso di Riccardo



Contrary to common belief, not all sweet wines are white. For example, a sweet, full-bodied, original sweet red wine is produced from the black Casavecchia grape.

The varietal has mysterious origins: some identify it with the grape that gave life to the ancient Trebulano, considered one of Italy's finest wines by Plinius. The Casavecchia-based Sasso di Riccardo di Terre del Principe is a truly delicious wine that pairs well either with the Conciato Romano pecorino cheese, made specifically to be paired with it by the beautiful Le Campestre agritourism, or with other types of soft cheeses.

Il Privilegio



A perfect example of freshness, balance and drinkability. The Privilegio produced by Feudi di San Gregorio, one of Irpinia's premier winemaking estates with headquarters in Sorbo Serpico and vineyards scattered throughout Campania, instantly wins over connoisseurs with its elegant, transparent

bottle which contains a clear, yellow gold liquid. The luminosity of this sweet wine made primarily from Fiano grapes is proportionate to its taste. Rich, sweet and fragrant yet balanced with acidity, it has a delightfully clean finish. This wine can either be paired with the area's traditional Christmas Susamielli cookies or with a Caciocavallo cheese, matured in caves in Irpinia.

Il Fastignano



Fastignano, a highly original Passito made from Primitivo grapes is only produced very rarely, not only for the small quantity of juice which can be obtained from the grapes,

but also for the difficulties found during production, from vineyard to the bottle. Antonio Papa has made a creed of the selection of the grapes of this varietal which is powerful and particularly well-suited to the production of sweet wines. Fastignano is sweet but not overwhelmingly sugary, a meditation wine boasting a strong personality. A gourmand companion to be drunk either on its own or paired with chocolate profiteroles or a slice of Sacher Torte.

Giardini Arimei



A complex wine-making project conceived by an enologist who loves Ischia, his birthplace of origin. Made from Biancolella, Forastera and

Uva Rilla grapes, this 'wine from the area of 'hot springs' is an original gem. Never sweet, Giardini Arimei, produced on the Island by the Muratori family, shows how unexpected tastes can be obtained from harvesting grapes at different times of the year. It is sweet but also dry, extremely well-balanced and highly versatile when it comes to pairings. As suggested by pastry maker Claudio Mignone or Executive Chef Mario Avallone it serves as a perfect accompaniment to either renowned Neapolitan cake - pastiera napoletana - or fresh Cacio cheese.

Welcome to the Naples Zoo!

It is one of the oldest zoological gardens in Italy. Home to more than 400 animal species, it is also a botanical garden and a recreational centre for families

Opened to the public in 1949, the Naples Zoo was one of the first zoological gardens in Italy to welcome visitors. Situated in the city centre, in Fuorigrotta, the Zoo hosts more than 400 animal species, including various species in danger of extinction. Here you can admire Samiango, lemurs, tigers, parrots, binturong, camels, zebras and Chital deer but also lots of birds, including emus, ostriches, grey crowned cranes, pink flamingoes and stalks. Inside, an educational farm allows children to get close to and pet all sorts of farm animals including geese, rabbits, goats and other domestic animals.

The zoo is also a botanical garden, a park brimming over with Mediterranean vegetation

and exotic species including Ginkgo Biloba of Chinese origin, boasting small, fan-shaped leaves but also various Magnolia SPP species, of Chinese, Japanese and American origin and bamboo originating from Asia. And then again, near the lake, visitors can admire Casuarina Equisetifolia, a she-oak species whose foliage consists of slender branches and hanging fruit resembling conifer cones. Additionally, near the area housing the lions, you will also find Cinnamomum Camphora, commonly known as the Camphor tree, a large evergreen tree that grows up to 20-30 m tall.

The Naples Zoo is also an important recreational centre, especially for families and children. Moreover, it plays a significant role

in terms of educating people about nature and the environment, with projects dedicated to scientific research and the preservation of biodiversity. One such example is its 'Adopt an animal' initiative which offers people the possibility of adopting an animal from the Zoo, thus giving them an opportunity to come into close contact with their favourite animal species: an intelligent way of teaching children about nature and instilling them with a sense of love for animals. Other highlights include gardens, play areas and loads of entertainment for young and old alike.

SIGHTSEEING From Pozzuoli to Baia, from the thermal baths to nightspots right up to guided tours of Solfatara and Rione Terra, here are Where's picks of unmissable night time experiences

By the name "Phlegrean Area" we intend the enormous volcanic area that extends North-West of Naples (the term 'Phlegrean derives from the Greek word Flegraios and means 'burning'). An area of outstanding geological interest, it is renowned for its beautiful lakes and cultural treasures. Here, for example, you will come across several must-see landmark attractions including Capo Miseno, the largest military port of ancient Rome, the Greek city of Cuma, the Parco Archeologico Sommerso in Baia, with its villas and temples lying below sea level and the Rione Terra in Pozzuoli, with its Roman town unearthed during an excavation campaign. These and many other natural treasures make the Phlegrean Area a sought-after tourist destination where, both in summer and winter, visitors can enjoy a vibrant nightlife scene.


One of the hottest clubs in the area, offering the ultimate nightlife experience, is Nabilah. Located on the famous Romana di Bacoli Beach, at night, this elegant, sophisticated beach resort attracts a slew of national and international celebrities. It boasts beautiful scenery, quality shows, international DJs and talented musicians.

Pozzuoli is the most important centre of the Phlegrean nightlife scene. Its clubs are a go-to destination for young people in search of relaxing atmospheres, fun and good food. Its most popular places include the Lungomare and the port, packed with loads of vibrant nightspots: small restaurants serving deliciously fresh fish, wine bars, sandwich bars and pizzerias. For those in search of a unique experience we suggest a guided tour of the underground world of Rione Terra, an evocative archaeological site dating back to 194BC. The seat of numerous historical events, from the first years of Greek and Roman colonization to the present time, it still boasts a trove of ancient ruins, overlaid by bits and pieces of successive civilizations. In its underground spaces, an almost intact archaeological itinerary gives visitors an idea of how the site must have

looked more than 2,000 years ago: an open-air museum featuring the entire history of Pozzuoli. (www.rioneterra.it). Another highly evocative experience is a night tour of the crater of Solfatara, one of the forty volcanoes comprising the Phlegrean Fields, located at a distance of some three kilometers from the centre of Pozzuoli: experienced tour guides enlighten visitors about its history, scientific background and mythology as they lead them up to its fumaroles where fresh blue fish, accompanied by a delicious local wine, is cooked at 160°C using the steam from one of its fumaroles. The tour lasts for around two hours (www.vulcanosolfatara.it). For Spa enthusiasts, we suggest a visit to the Terme di Agnano (Thermal Baths of Agnano) and the Stufe di Nerone (Nero's Stoves), the two most famous spa complexes in the area boasting

pools rich in precious natural elements that help rejuvenate the body. The Stufe di Nerone are located in Bacoli and boast more than 20 hot and cold springs. Other on-site amenities include a semi-Olympic swimming pool, heated to 35°C, also open in winter, and an indoor swimming pool, heated to 40°C, whose energized warm waters relax tight muscles and stimulate the release of endorphins. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, the 'Stufe' remain open until 11pm (www.termestufedinerone.it). Alternately, the Thermal Baths are located in Agnano. On-site amenities include two outdoor thermal pools and four indoor pools with hydromassage; a large green poolside area, complete with sun loungers and umbrellas, make a day at this oasis of peace even more inviting (www.termidiagnano.it).

The Vertebra Oracle in Naples 2015

Rebecca Horn returns in Naples with a personal exhibition featuring sculptures and drawings related to poetry. Also on display, her imposing sculpture entitled "Revelation of a Tree"

A personal exhibition by Rebecca Horn, one of the most versatile and creative artists of our times, who works across different media including sculpture, installations, performances, painting, film and poetry. Over the past forty years, she has produced a highly complex oeuvre that is grounded and bound together by an ongoing meditation on metaphysical issues and a deep existential desire.

Her last exhibition at Studio Trisorio in Naples was in 2012 when – exactly ten years after her installation 'Mother of Pearl Spirits' in Piazza del Plebiscito – she returned with her 'Capuzzelle' exhibition to re-examine themes of rebirth and the reciprocity between the dimension of life and death. 'Capuzzelle' (cast-iron skulls) continued to feature in her work for many years, at different museums across the world, including Berlin, New Delhi, Maribor and Moscow and, most recently, at Llotja in Palma di Maiorca.

Her exhibition in Naples will feature sculptures and drawings related to poetry, including, first and foremost, "Vertebra Oracle for the future". Her imposing sculpture entitled "Revelation of a Tree" will also be on display. The sculpture features tree limbs cast in bronze sitting on a polished steel table; amid the branches, a ring of brass spindles opens and closes slowly, evoking a decelerated heart valve, or perhaps a spider enveloping its prey. The works of Rebecca Horn have been displayed at personal exhibitions at several of the world's most important museums including the Guggenheim Museum in New York, the Tate Gallery in London, the Nationalgalerie and the Martin-Gropius-Bau in Berlin, the Museum of Contemporary Art in Tokyo and the Centro Cultural Banco do Brasil in Rio de Janeiro and San Paolo. In 2010, she founded the Moontower Foundation. In Italy, her installations are part of permanent collections at the MADRE museum in Naples and at the Castello di Rivoli Museum of Contemporary Art in Turin.

THE UFFIZI AT CASAL DI PRINCIPE

The exhibition focuses on the painting of the seventeenth century Neapolitan artists or followers of the Baroque artist Caravaggio who had ties with Naples including Artemisia Gentileschi, Luca Giordano and Mattia Preti, but also the Fate Presto painting by Andy Warhol from the Reggia di Caserta. A villa confiscated from a boss of the Camorra, and now dedicated to the memory of Don Peppe Diana, a priest murdered in his church by the clan's hit men in 1993, has become a museum hosting works of art originating from the Uffizi Gallery in Florence.

MONUMENTS & PLACES OF INTEREST

CASTEL DELL'OVO - According to ancient Neapolitan legend, its name stems from the egg which Virgil, the Latin poet, supposedly hid in its foundations to support the fortifications. The place where the egg was preserved was closed by heavy locks and kept secret because it was believed that all the facts and fortunes of Castel Marino depended upon it. From that time onwards, the fate of the castle and the entire city, was linked to that egg. The castle's fortifications and terrace offer a breathtaking view over the gulf - Open Mon-Sat 8am-7pm, Sun 8am-2pm - Borgo Marinaro - T: 081.2400055

CASTEL NUOVO - Also known as Maschio Angioino, it is one of the most recognizable symbols of the city built in 1279 by Charles I, king of Naples, as a royal residence for the House of Anjou. From the time that it was built, it was termed "New" to distinguish it from the older Castles of Ovo and Capuano. Worthy of note are its underground passages, its two towers and its courtyard, from which you can enjoy a fabulous view, its gallery and Piazza d'armi. Open Mon-Sat 9am - 7pm - via Vittorio Emanuele III - T: 081.7955877

CASTEL SANT'ELMO - The first documented information regarding the castle dates back to 1275. This star-shaped castle was originally a church dedicated to St. Erasmus. In 1329 it was enlarged at the behest of Robert of Anjou, who transformed it into a real palatium for himself and his court. Later Spanish viceroy Don Pedro de Toledo had it further fortified in 1538. Used as a military prison until the 1970s, in 1976 important restoration work on the

CHIESA DEL GESÙ NUOVO - Erected by the Jesuits between 1584 and 1601, its façade is actually part of a 15th century Renaissance palace. Its interior is spacious and light with a rich covering of coloured marbles and typical Florid Neapolitan frescoes. After the church was ravaged by fire in 1639, Cosimo Fanzago was commissioned to carry out restoration works that gave the Church a Baroque appearance. Its interior boasts a number of magnificent frescoes while its chapels feature the works of renowned artists of the calibre of Massimo Stanzione and Giuseppe Ribera. Particularly worthy of note are its sculptural work and polychrome marble floor. Open Mon-Sun 7am-12.30pm and 4pm-7.30pm - piazza del Gesù - T: 081.5518613

CHIESA DI SAN DOMENICO MAGGIORE - Charles II of Anjou began the extensive rebuilding that produced the Church of San Domenico Maggiore. The work was done between 1238 and 1324, but the church has undergone extensive modifications over the centuries, including one in 1670 that recast the structure in the style of the Baroque. In the 19th century, however, the church was restored to its original Gothic design and is a motley combination of the two styles. Among the many artistic points of interest in the basilica are the frescoed ceiling by Francesco Solimena and sculptural works, including the high altar by Cosimo Fanzago - Open Mon-Sun 8.30am-12-noon and 4.30pm-7pm - piazza S. Domenico Maggiore, 8 - T: 081.459188

CHIESA DI SAN FRANCESCO DI PAOLA - One of the most characteristic and famous of all Neapolitan churches. Built in the mid-19th century, its circular form is reminiscent of the Pantheon in Rome. On

the exterior, under a magnificent colonnade, you can see the statues of the four cardinal virtues and the three theological virtues while, at the sides of the stairway you will find two equestrian statues of king Ferdinand and his father, Charles III of Spain. CITTÀ DELLA SCIENZA - The science museum pride of the city, which attracted thousand of visitors every year, was almost entirely destroyed by an arson attack that shook Naples, Italy and the whole world on March 4 2013. A huge loss that is already being remedied with the reconstruction. The pavilions that at the moment are available are few: Science Centre, Officina dei Piccoli, Teatro Galileo 104, where it operates the cooperative Le Nuvole, the Congress Centre and the Science Store - Open Tue-Sat 9am-3pm; Sun 10am-5pm; closed on Monday - Via Coroglio, 104 - T: 081.7352424 - T: 0817352220 - www.cittadellascienza.it

COMPLESSO MONUMENTALE DI SANTA CHIARA - It includes a Church, a Monastery and a Convent. One of the principal monuments of medieval Naples, its construction began in 1310 at the behest of Robert of Anjou and his second wife Sancia di Maiorca, who, both devotees of St. Francis of Assisi and Santa Chiara, wanted to build a Franciscan citadel to house the Clarisse nuns in the monastery and the Friars Minor in the adjacent convent. Behind the church is the Cloister of the Clarisse, the monastery's main cloister, strikingly decorated with bright majolica tiles and considered a masterpiece of Neapolitan art. DUOMO - Known as the Duomo di San Gennaro or Duomo di Santa Maria Assunta, the Cathedral was erected at the end of the 13th century by Charles of Anjou. Its present appearance is the result of the numerous modifications that took place over the centuries, partially altering its original Gothic form. Off the right aisle of the nave is the Chapel of St. Januarius (Capella di San Gennaro), that also functions as the cathedral treasury (Tesoro) and is elaborately decorated with Baroque art - Open Mon-Sat 8am-12.30pm and 4.30pm-7pm, Sun 8am-1.30pm and 5pm-7.30pm - via Duomo, 147 - T: 081.449097

GALLERIA UMBERTO I - A mammoth steel and glass masterpiece built on the site of an entire block that was razed to the ground following the cholera epidemic of 1884. The Galleria was built as part of a program of renovation and modernization of the city which began with the Unification of Italy when a tender was put out. The winning project envisaged four large buildings joined to each other by an arcade designed by the engineer Paolo Boubée. Measuring 15 metres in width and 57 metres in height, the galleria was built between 1887 and 1890 and is a wonderful late Victorian marriage of technology with art. The Galleria has four access points: via San Carlo, via Santa Brigida, via Giuseppe Verdi and via Toledo.

ORTO BOTANICO - Founded in 1807 with a decree signed by King Joseph Bonaparte, Napoleon's brother, the botanical gardens extend over a surface area of almost 12 hectares. Dedicated

REAL ALBERGO DEI POVERI - One of the largest, most imposing buildings in Europe it was designed by architect Ferdinando Fuga in 1751, at the behest of King Charles III of the House of Bourbon. Originally designed to be 600 metres long with five courtyards and a church in the centre, due to a severe lack of funds, only the three innermost courtyards were built. Plans to complete the building according to the original design were

VILLA COMUNALE - Its gardens run parallel to the sea in via Caracciolo on reclaimed land featuring almost one kilometre of holm oaks, palm trees, eucalyptus trees and spacious flowerbeds embellished by Neo-classical sculptures, fountains and buildings including Casina Pompeiana and the Cassa Armonica. Designed by Carlo Vanvitelli the Villa Comunale was built in the 1780s by Bourbon King Ferdinand IV as a "Royal Garden" for members of the royal family. Following restoration work by Milanese architect Mendini with coloured chalets and a gold gate, it assumed a more modern appearance. The centre of the villa houses the Stazione Zoologica Anton Dohrn, an important research centre and home to one of the oldest aquariums in Europe. CERTOSA DI SAN MARTINO - Lying atop a hill in the Vomero district, the former monastery dominates the entire Gulf of Naples. A national monument since 1866, it houses the National Museum of San Martino, featuring a large display of "presepi" or nativity scenes by masters of the Neapolitan school. Pompeii

The day when it all ended. Historic notes



The first stable settlement in Pompeii was founded around the seventh century B.C. by the indigenous population of the Oscans, subsequently being subjected to the political and cultural influence of the Greeks and the Etruscans. Towards the end of the fifth century B.C. Pompeii also fell under the sphere of influence of the Sannites, who took possession of the whole of Campania, establishing a flourishing civilization. Rome also took part in the interminable succession of wars that followed (343-201 B.C.), becoming the dominant power of the entire region, resulting in its development as a thriving port and trading centre.

Pompeii experienced a period of enormous prosperity apparent in the construction of luxurious dwellings like Casa del Fauno. Starting from the first century B.C., Pompeii's wealth continued to be based, for the most part, on the trade of products sourced from around the area: wine, wool and garum, a famous fish sauce used as a condiment. The devastating eruption of Vesuvius in 79 A.D. involved the south-western area of Vesuvius, causing all signs of life to disappear under a thick crust of volcanic ash. In Rome, Emperor Titus, created a special senatorial committee to organize the rescue of its survivors and assess the extent of the damage in a bid to rebuild the city.

All in vain: Pompeii had been almost entirely buried by the fury of the volcano, while Herculaneum had disappeared completely.



In discovery of Caserta

Caserta is a small centre, boasting a rich heritage of artistic, architectural and historical treasures. Where has selected a pick of its most noteworthy landmark attractions that should be visited at least once in a lifetime.

THE REGGIA OF CASERTA

A visit to this magnificent royal residence, second only to the splendors of Versailles, starts with the Royal Palace, whose construction, entrusted to Neapolitan architect Luigi Vanvitelli, was commissioned by Carlo III Bourbon.

The Palace boasts as many as 1,200 rooms, all decorated according to the style of the era.

A large staircase adorned with two lions, sculpted in Carrara marble,

alludes to the grandeur of the kingdom and leads to the first floor, to the eight Royal Apartments, featuring vaults decorated with stunning frescoes and to the Palatine Library and the Palatine Chapel, embellished with sixteen Corinthian marble columns. There are lots of rooms worth visiting: from the horseshoe-shaped Teatro di Corte (Court Theatre) to the Sala Ellittica (Oval Hall) which is painted in white and contains the magnificent Bourbon manager scene. Back on the ground floor at the end of the main gallery, you come out onto the Reggia's magnificent park: a masterpiece of nature, it extends over more than 100 hectares and is adorned with fountains and pools. The most evocative area of the park is the

beautiful English Garden created for Queen Maria Carolina, the wife of Ferdinand IV: exotic plants, hot houses, small woods, intricate pathways and a small temple with ancient Roman statues taken from the ruins of Pompeii combine to make it a totally unique place.

Inside, a separate pathway leads to the Bagno di Venere, where a statue of Venus shows the goddess shyly preparing to take a bath near the small fountain.

THE BELVEDERE OF SAN LEUCIO

Just a few kilometers from the Royal Palace of Caserta, visitors will find a unique example of an illuminist-inspired imperial utopia, a ground breaking project conceived by King Ferdinand IV who created an independent community called Ferdinandopoli.

The King promoted the production and manufacture of silk by sending youngsters from the area to train and learn the art of silk making in France in order to subsequently work in the royal factories. In 1778, he founded the Royal Colony of San Leucio based on a separate code of laws.

In addition to a beautiful Italianate garden, a tour of the site includes a visit to the Royal Apartments.

From the terrace of the Belvedere, visitors can enjoy a splendid view that stretches as far as Vesuvius, and on clear days, it is even possible

to catch a glimpse of Ischia and Capri. The complex also houses the Silk Museum which contains the original tools used to weave silk in the 17th century. The silks produced here are still purchased by illustrious clients from all over the world, including the White House, the Quirinale and Buckingham Palace.

CASERTAVECCHIA

The medieval fortress town of Casertavecchia is situated at a distance of some ten km from the city. Its terraces, scattered here and there, offer a panoramic view over the city, including Vanvitelli's Reggia, Vesuvius and the islands of the Gulf. Scattered throughout the town's narrow medieval streets are craft shops and numerous small restaurants specializing in typical cuisine. Take an evocative trip back through time.

You'll be delighted by the heady aromas of nature and the wood burning ovens found in its houses.

Dominated by a castle that is today in ruins, the village is built around the cathedral, a fine example of Norman-Arab architectural style built in 1100.

Dedicated to St. Michael The Archangel, the Duomo boasts three naves. Elegant yet simple, it is a favourite destination for brides who choose it to say "I do" on their big day.


